From Our Pastor - Rev. Andrew Lovins

We had a terrific Easter season. Thanks to everyone for showing up and giving their best to make Jesus known in our community.

I recently asked for suggestions regarding topics you'd like to hear from the pulpit. I had some actionable recommendations, such as: dealing with the death of parents, sin, our place in the church, roles and gifts of the Spirit, and spiritual warfare. Also, a few other topics were mentioned that I would like to address here.

WHY NOT PREACH ON THE BOOK OF REVELATION?

I know the future and the meaning of the book of Revelation: Christ is returning, and we win! But, beyond this, we often enter into the realm of much speculation.

Teaching Bible prophecy should never be done to satisfy unhealthy curiosity about tertiary matters. However, I usually hit the high notes of prophetic revelation a few Sundays every year. The second coming, resurrection, and judgment to come are implicit themes in my preaching. On occasion, I make them explicit.

HOW SHOULD A PREACHER DRESS?

Someone asked me why I don't wear a robe when I preach. It is not a requirement for a UCC clergyman to wear a robe. And I'm not particularly eager to look like a character from the Harry Potter movies.

On a more serious note, God has called me to shed any signs of elitism. If I "dress down" a little, maintaining a professional appearance, it is less confusing and intimidating to new generations and the unchurched. My goal is to reach the unreached more than it is to satisfy the tastes of the already convinced. "There is more rejoicing in heaven over one sinner that repents than ninety-nine righteous persons that don't need to repent" (Luke 15:7).

HOW DO YOU FEEL ABOUT THE UCC?

Many things about the UCC have enriched me, but nearly all denominations are rapidly declining. I have nothing but affection for how the UCC has nurtured me. But we live in a post-denominational era. Denominational bonds will play a minor role in future ministry vitality. Our institutions are eroded by age and radical mission drift, which will continue unabated.

Despite my conviction that many historic denominations, including ours, will no longer play a significant role in congregational development, I am not discouraged. God always births new movements to grow new disciples. Remember, "Our help is in the name of the Lord" (Psalm 124:8).

OPINIONS

I think it is essential that congregations give pastors some flexibility to express their individuality as long as the pastor stays faithful to the gospel and lives with integrity. I communicate my opinions based on observation and research, with a fair amount of theological reflection tossed in. If you disagree with me, I celebrate your freedom to do so. Every person must conduct their life and ministry according to conscience.

I feel a strong sense of divine call to St. Paul's, but God didn't bring me to St. Paul's to merely keep the wheels greased. If "business as usual" had been maximally effective, we'd be running thousands in worship after generations of faithful ministry. It is time for us to re-think ministry effectiveness and focus on soul-winning and radical discipleship in a manner that speaks to our generation.





Through Hoyleton, the Family Care group is able to offer the "Kids Rebound" program in area school districts, including New Athens. "Kids Rebound" helps young people who are coping with the divorce,

young people who are coping with the divorce, separation, or even death of their parents

The Family Care ministry also sponsors a number of different workshops and seminars. Some have dealt with the issues adolescents and their parents face. Others looked at the challenges of parenting toddlers.
